TRADITION FOUR

"Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole."

Step four

Early one morning I was meditating on my Step 4, particularly where our literature says, "A business that takes no regular inventory usually goes broke". I envisioned myself as a business whose storefront was clean, well-kept and inviting. Upon close inspection, the storefront was false, an illusion like that of a Hollywood set. Upon entering the building, I noticed a doorway to the back room. Full of fear I cautiously approached the door realizing that I must open it and enter, but I could not, I did not have the key. It came to me that I did have the key after all; the key was my Steps 1, 2 and 3. The opened door revealed a dark, dusty room filled high with old, battered boxes. The boxes contained all my anger, resentments, failings, and sins; in short, the wreckage of my past - I was overwhelmed. Suddenly I noticed a sliver of light coming from a far corner. As I approached the source of the light, I saw it was emanating from someone standing there. In my fear and arrogance, I asked "Who are you, the stock boy?" Without speaking my answer came, "No I am the Boss, I own everything in this room, and I own the building and the land upon which it stands". Humbled and shaken, I suddenly realized to whom I had been addressing. With downcast eyes, I said "Please I need your help with all this". He told me that everything in this room is expired old stock, of no importance any longer. As he spoke the room began to get brighter until that dark, dusty room was suddenly transformed into a clean well-lit space, I turned to see all the old boxes had been removed, but in the center of this renewed space was one box, a large gift wrapped package. "These are the promised gifts of the Program Peter, they are yours! They are yours to keep provided you keep Me close. I left the room and the building and walked out to the warm, all-embracing Sunshine of the Spirit.

From the desk of the "retired" Office Manager of Edmonton Central Office

As I am working on the last couple of weeks as your Edmonton Central Office (ECO) office manager I wanted to put down some of my thoughts about some of things that have happened over the last 8 years.

I was hired temporarily in early April of 2016 and together with the Central Office Board (and the A.A. community) we had a lot of work to do. The first 16 months were about getting all the books in order, paying outstanding debt and reapplying for our charitable status with the CRA. During all of that I was getting to know all the volunteers in the office and learning about all the tasks that they perform.

In July of 2017 we were granted our charitable status under the name of Edmonton Central Office Society. At this point the COB and Intergroup decided to keep me on as your permanent "Special Worker". With the new society came more tasks like developing a new set of Intergroup Operating Procedures that would align with our new Society Bylaws.

The next few years went along smoothly, and we were doing what we were supposed to do, keeping the phones manned and keeping the AAWS and Grapevine literature stocked on the shelves to be available to the A.A community. With the continued backing of the A.A. fellowship we were able to build up our prudent reserve.

Then the great pause happened in 2020, and we went down to me and one volunteer in the office (and our web administrator *extraordinaire*) and we managed to help the A.A. community navigate the changes happening to our meetings on our website and in our paper directory (closing meetings, opening meetings, moving meetings to online) as well as keeping the phone lines open for all who needed to call in. I was so proud of our fellowship that we were able to help all the folks reaching out for help!

The Principle of Step 12 is SERVICE and can be defined as a helpful act; a contribution to the welfare of others, useful labor that does not produce a tangible commodity.

There are an incredible number of members of Alcoholics Anonymous who are currently doing Step 12 Service work, and this is the reason why A.A. works. From opening meetings, making coffee, reaching out and shaking the hands of folks coming into your meeting, being an Intergroup Rep, or GSR of your group, to working on a service committee or the chair of a service committee, to being on the Central Office Board, this is all vital service work that makes A.A. work.

I want to thank all the volunteers that have come into the office to keep our doors open! We could not operate without your dedicated service. Did you know that we have 18 volunteers that put in four hour shifts once per week? That is 3,744 hours of volunteer work per year to help keep the doors open and help the still suffering alcoholic.

I have been so fortunate to work under the direction of the Central Office Board for the past ninety-six months and have marveled at their tireless dedication to making sure that we are practicing the principles in all our affairs, making sure that ECO is a welcoming place that is open to all Alcoholics present and future. These members have shown a great deal of humility in their Service!

It is said that Gratitude is an action word and I know that action is highly rewarding. So, if you see a member who is doing service work, please say thank you and perhaps you could ask what they do and maybe follow in their footsteps.

I am so blessed to have been your ECO manager, getting to know so many members of our community and I am sure that you will be giving our new ECO manager, Jesica L. the same warm welcome.

Experience, Strength and Hope – For the Love of Sponsorship

This is my 4th and last article I write in honor of my brother Mike's love of sponsoring others in AA. It will be a year this month since he passed away. In his writings he used a quote from Clancy's talk in the mid 1990's that described how helping others helps us stay sober and is still relevant today –

"When I sit across from that sick S.O.B. nothing distracts me, for it is just one alcoholic talking and listening to another. I suddenly realize that for a few hours I'm listening to that sick Son of a Bitch S.O.B. and I find that I'm not so worried about this S.O.B.!

Mike said that helping someone work through **Step 4** – *Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves* is as simple as suggesting (he used stronger language) that the alcoholic follow the instructions laid out in the Big Book on pages 64-71 in the 4th edition. What? Follow instructions? Hah, in my experience I had to try much more complicated ways to get through Step 4. I recall tons of instruction sheets from varied resources on how to write out a Step 4 scattered all over my bed as I waded through my first moral inventory! Years later, after listening to other more seasoned alcoholics, I decided to try the step as outlined in the Big Book. It worked! And it formed the basis for the steps to follow.

Another quote I found in Mike's writing is from Mother Theresa when she was asked shortly before she died - what would happen to all her legacies (children in Calcutta, lepers in Africa, etc.) when she was gone. She responded, "I'm sure God will find someone more useless than me to do greater miracles".

The miracle we see in our program is the alcoholic who sobers up and stays sober through following the steps while listening to and helping others. I think the other miracle (often still in the making) happens when we can show humility in the work we do helping others.

The anonymity of all authors will be observed whether their story is selected for publication or not.

It was Sunday March 17, 1991 when the life changing miracle happened and something snapped inside me, after much pain & suffering throughout the years. I was 37 then and am now 70 – wow! I had been through treatment, which was explained to me that treatment ends and recovery is one day at a time, which really made sense to me. I was so desperate and so grateful to see a fellow from treatment outside of the Detox Center, where the AA meeting was about to begin. No coincidence, God knew what I needed. I was a member of the Terra Nova Group from then straight through to when

So this morning I experienced a lot of emotion connecting to the fatal nature of alcoholism and the spiritual nature of this recovery path, that, yes, continues one day a time – one moment at a time. The set of railroad tracks that's etched in my mind – the disease progresses, and the recovery progresses. Recently on a recording I heard a member say that his Sponsor says to him each day –

"OK, your disease progressed overnight, so what's your action plan for today?" I like how this affirms our Big Book "It is easy to let up on the spiritual program of action and rest on our laurels. We are headed for trouble if we do for alcohol is a subtle foe. We are not cured of alcoholism. What we really have is a daily reprieve contingent on the maintenance of our spiritual condition."

I've accepted better over these years that I will have challenges, especially in my inner life, yet, the spiritual solution is still the solution, and learning to love, forgive, and care for myself is included. I had no idea how to do that, and I'm still learning. I am still growing up and learning to live in balance instead of extremes.

So it is with a heart filled with gratitude for Alcoholics Anonymous I send this big thank you, along with big hugs to all of you I am blessed to have met in the beginning and along the way.
